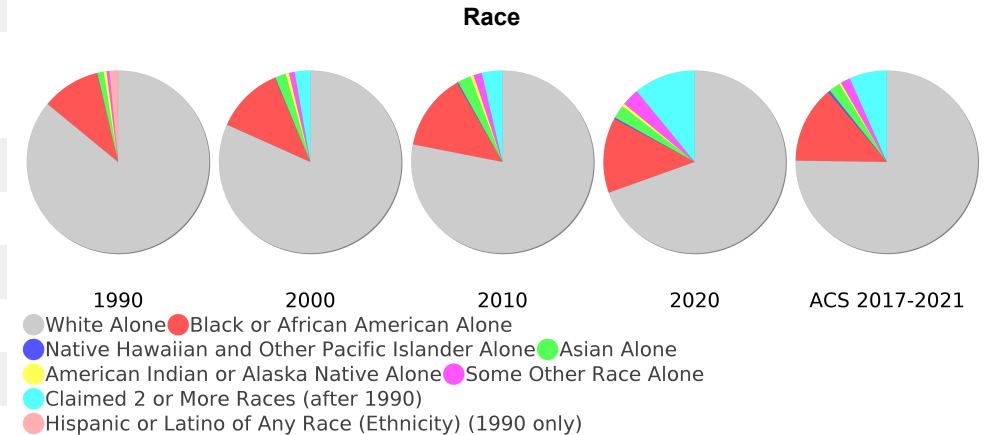

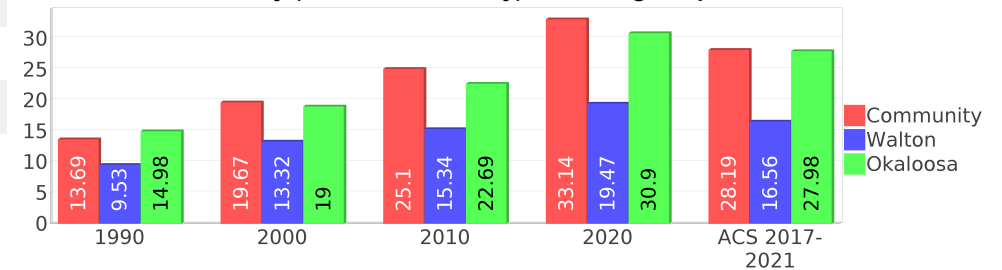

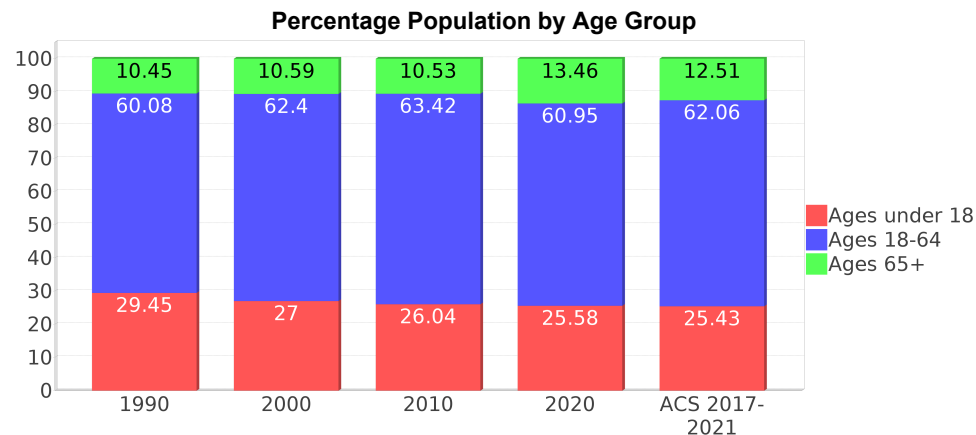


Minority (Race and Ethnicity) Percentage Population



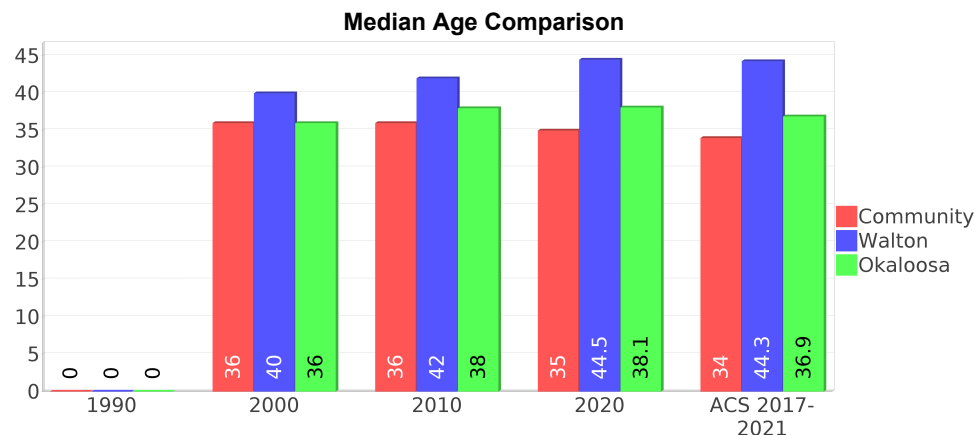

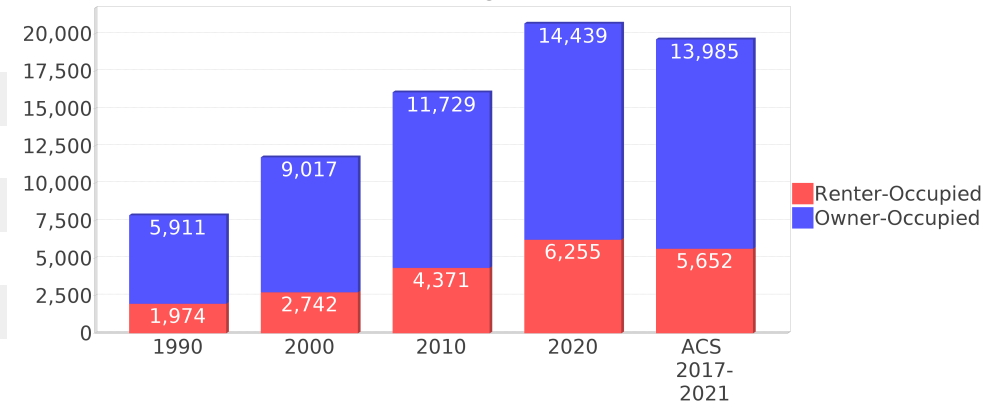

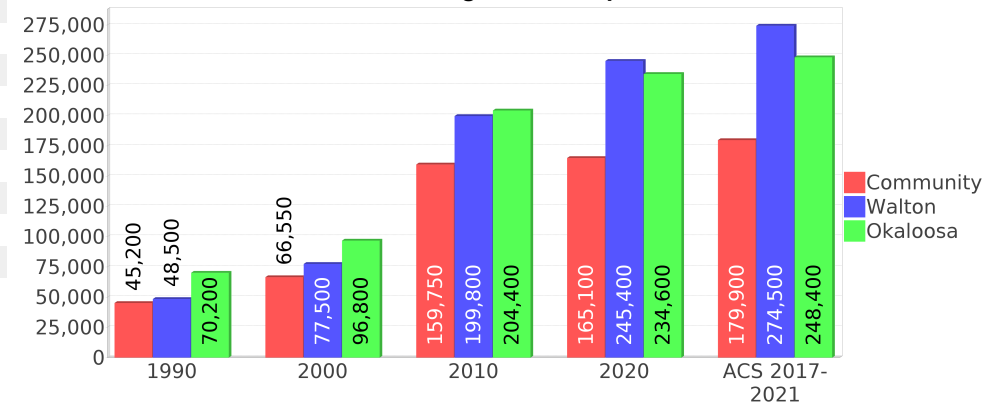

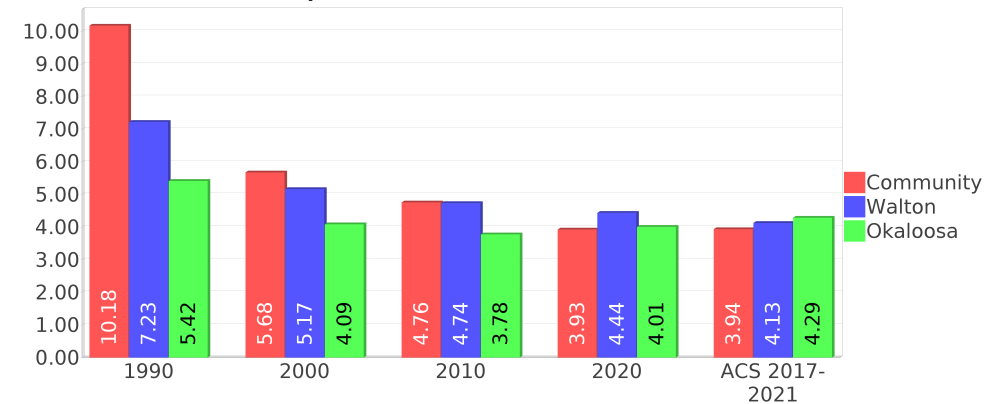
Housing Tenure

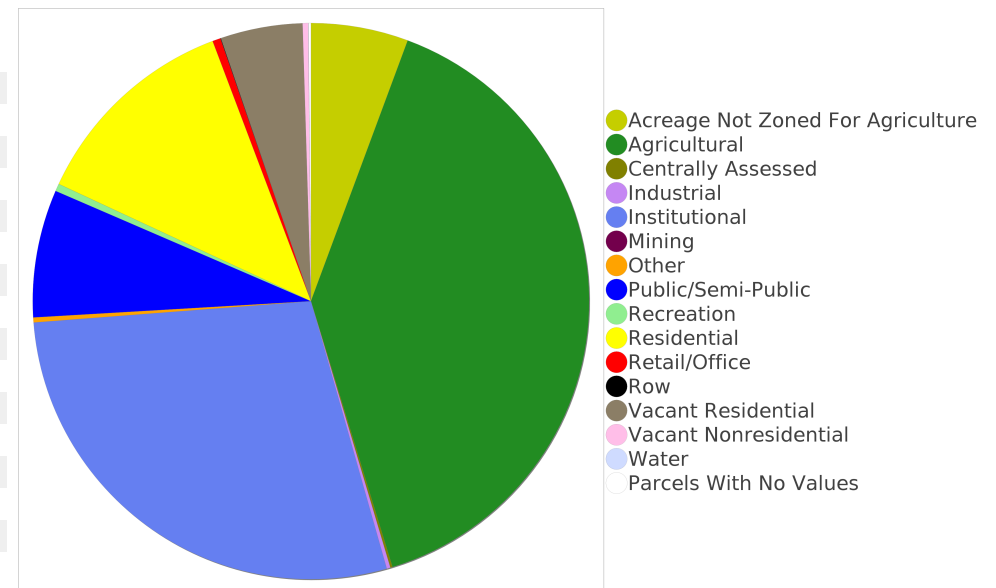

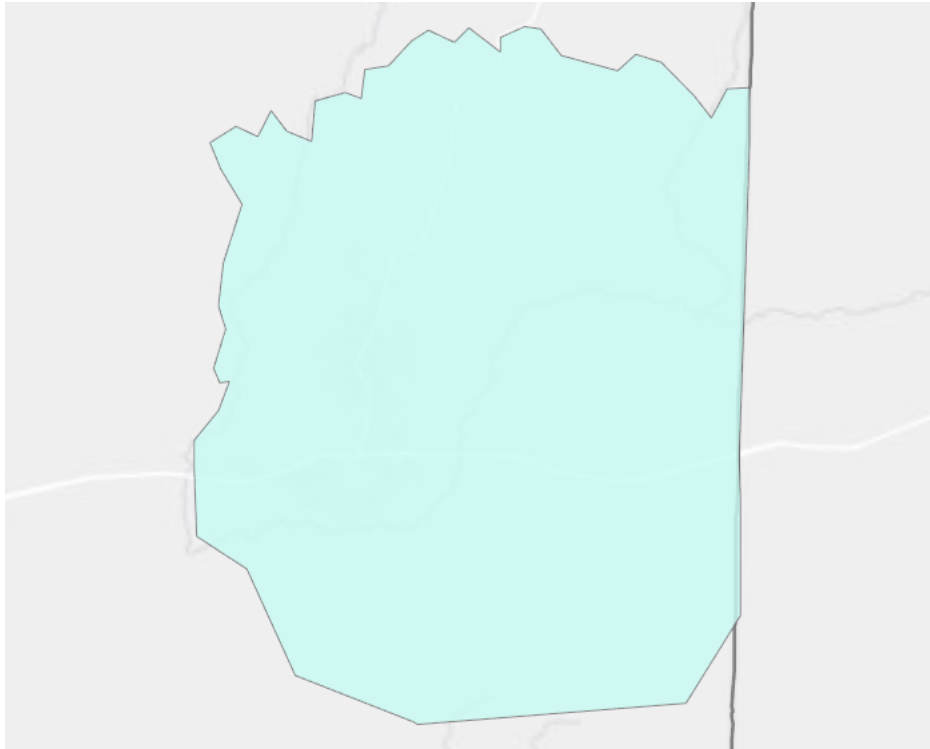

Community Values and Vision"Build It And They Will Come" ... once said in a popular movie ... is what is now happening in the Greater Crestview Area, as well laid plans come to fruition. And, as it forges through the decade, the GCA is poised for continued accelerated growth. It is the pledge of community, civic and business leaders to build a better place for all to live, work and raise a family or build their business ... and to maintain that special "quality of life" that has always been a special part of Crestview and Northern Okaloosa County. The Strategic Partnership Initiative (SPI) is a grass roots organization formed by Okaloosa-Walton Community College, Eglin Air Force Base, and others to take a strategic view of the area and work toward goals that will benefit the region. One regional initiative is the formation of a regional transportation authority (RTA) that would seek out funding, not available to MPOs, for transportation improvements. A Crestview Bypass is one of the proposed projects. The leader of the initiative, the President of Okaloosa-Walton Community College, stepped away from the initiative this year to determine if sufficient community support was there to keep the idea alive. Another group that has been a tremendous help in lending their wealth of expertise to local issues is the Institute for Senior Professionals of Okaloosa-Walton Community College. The Institute is very interested in transportation issues and one of its members wrote the history and first part of this section, as part of a project to compile community profiles for the Fort Walton Beach Urbanized Area. The Institute can be reached through the community college. With its strong ties to the military, and the technical nature of Eglin's mission, Crestview enjoys the benefits of an educated and progressive citizenry. No developable land is left in the coastal area. Crestview has room for expansion, and citizens support planned growth so that Crestview will retain its attractive quality of life.

History ⁴

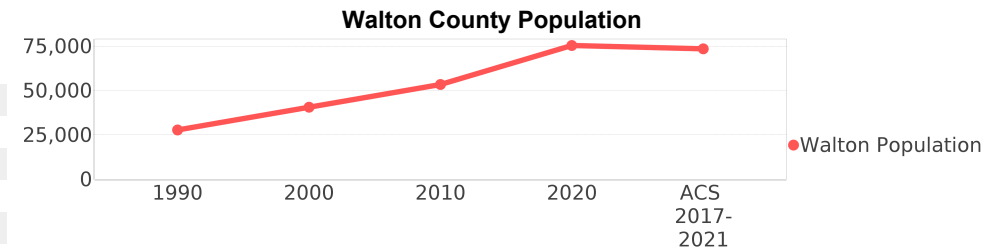
Crestview is one of the fastest growing cities in Florida, and rated second in the State, with a 49% increase in the past decade, as people began to discover the affordable land, accessible transportation, available markets, great climate and a population diverse in talent, age and cultures. The Hub City is located in the Northern Part of Okaloosa County, in Florida's Great Northwest. Three major transportation arteries - Interstate-10, and U. S. Highway 90 - connect the Greater Crestview Area from Pensacola to Jacksonville - and Florida 85 ties the Southeast USA to the beautiful Emerald Coast of the Gulf of Mexico, home of the World's most beautiful beaches. The I-10 West corridor links Crestview with major U. S. cities, such as Mobile, New Orleans and Houston. Eastward along I-10 is Tallahassee, Florida's Capital City, then on to Jacksonville and the Atlantic Ocean. From railroad whistle-stop to Okaloosa County Seat, Crestview has made its way from a settlement of a half-dozen families to the home of an "economically energized region". The Greater Crestview Area consists of the towns of Baker, Milligan, Holt and Laurel Hill, beginning at Shoal River on 85 North, as it leaves Eglin Air Force Base Reservation, the largest military facility in the United States, with 724 square miles. The Hub City began in 1881 when the Pensacola and Atlantic Railroad built a track between Pensacola and Apalachicola River. When completed in 1882, it was the first passenger and freight railroad track in Northwest Florida. In 1887, the Yellow River Railroad built a track running North to Floral, Alabama. At Crestview's inception, the two railroads made the community. It has been said, "there was nothing but a fork in the railroad". And, Retired Judge Gillis Powell's father was the 'whole town', since he was both postmaster and railroad station manager and sold tickets.. Crestview is 270 feet above sea level - the highest in Florida - but it really got its name

by being on 'the crest of the hill' , and you could, and can today, see it coming from any direction. This peak is a long woodland range between the Yellow and Shoal rivers, which flow almost parallel on the east and west side of the city. On September 7, 1915, in a special election, and after a heated contest and runoff with Baker, then bigger in size, Crestview won the designation as county seat on April 13, 1917. It has been that ever since, and Crestview began to grow. From 1925 to 1956, the population increased more than 11 times, going from 673 to 7,495. Crestview's growth is most unique because so much of it occurred during the Depression. It was reported that in 1929 Atlanta and Crestview were the only cities experiencing growth. Now a county seat, Crestview became a market center. As roads were built and improved in the 1930's, it became known as the Hub City because it could be reached from six directions, four directions by train, and by plane from anywhere, even as far away as California. In 1940, at Crestview and Eglin Field, as it was known, the movie 12 O'clock High starring Gregory Peck was filmed. Some of the residents, who were fill-ins in the movie, thought the city might become another Hollywood. Crestview and its surrounding areas have gained national recognition as "Top Ten Places to Live and Work", and "Top 10 Best Smaller Places in America". The Greater Crestview Area has become a key element of Northwest Florida's growth and a successful competitor in attracting business relocation, expansion and development. Crestview is booming! At the end of the first quarter of 2002, the Crestview city population was 15,251, and the entire Greater Crestview Area, including Baker, Milligan, Holt, Laurel Hill, and Crestview was 41,428 - within a 20 mile radius of Crestview's center - 75,443. The Northern Part of Okaloosa County is rapidly growing! In the City of Crestview, demographics reveal the average median age is 34, and 79.8% are Caucasian (white), 18.0% are African American (black). Average family income is \$37,700. There are 8% of second home owners. Visitors traffic is extremely high year-round, and at the I-10 exit, there are seven major motel/hotel chains, with full-service facilities. The Greater Crestview Area employment by occupation percentages are: White Collar 46.7%, Blue Collar 53.3%, Administrative Support/Clerical 14.2%, Executive, Admin & Managerial 9.2%, Machine Operators & Assemblers 3.1%, Handlers, Cleaners & Helpers 5.0%, Materials 3.4%, Primary 2.1%, Private Home Service 0.6%, Production 12.9%, Professional Specialty 12.1%, Sales 10.6%, Services 20.9% and Technicians & Support 3.1%. The major businesses and employers in Crestview are: Walmart, Aerospace Integration Corp., Edward J. Mlynarscyk, Crestview Aerospace, National Electronic Warranty, Bayou Mechanical, Crestview Medical Clinic, North Okaloosa Medical Center, HealthSouth, Ryan's, Cracker Barrel, Tom Thumb and Ritz. The Greater Crestview Area's livelihood has evolved over the years from mostly agricultural to an industrially diverse growth community. Crestview has three industrial parks that offer prime locations and infrastructure for beginning, expanding and relocating companies. The Okaloosa AirPark is the largest industrial park consisting of 440 acres, located around Crestview's Bob Sikes Airport and its 8,500-foot runway. It is a full-service field based operation and access to aircraft modification facilities of commercial aerospace companies in the park. AirPark is one mile from U. S. 90, FL 85 and the CSX Railroad line. Now, I-10 East/West is three miles, but it is projected in the near future, as the demands of the park continue to grow, that a direct exit West of Crestview will be completed. Recently, 4.8 acres of AirPark received from The Governor's Office, State of Florida, and Office of Tourism, Trade and Economic Development official designation as a Florida Enterprise Zone. The effective date was January 1, 2002 and will be effective until December 31, 2005. As a result, new businesses located within the designated area will be eligible for the financial incentives offered by the State of Florida and local governments. This Enterprise Zone will greatly enhance the development and revitalization the Greater Crestview Area. Additional industrial facilities include: Holt Industrial Park, 10 miles West of Crestview, 117 acres and includes a 20,000 square foot flexible manufacturing facility. The Holt Industrial Park is a short distance to rail, ports and other transportation infrastructure. The Laurel Hill Industrial Park is located 15 miles North off I-10 and consists of 35 acres for development. Also, Shoal River Ranch, 11,000 acres, formerly the largest cattle ranch in Florida, is now being planned for industrial development, including a residential area, a world-class golf course, with major motel/hotel and restaurant facilities and a industrial/office park. Military Okaloosa County is the most U. S. Department of Defense dependent county in the State of Florida. More than 20,000 jobs and billions of dollars are tied directly to activities at Eglin Air Force Base, Hurlburt Field and Duke Field. Eglin's seventy-year history has had a considerable economic impact on the county, and especially the Greater Crestview Area. There are over 10,000 military and over 4,000 civilian employees in the area. Estimates show over 29,000 military retirees have retired in the county, and the Greater Crestview Area is home to many. Duke Field, seven miles from Crestview, is home to the 919th Special Operations Wing (SOW), one of the most unique organizations in the Air Force reserves and the U.S. Air Force. They provide "a ready force" to deploy on a moments notice anywhere in the world. / AF+Where the Eglin Air Force Base Reservation ends ... The Greater Crestview Area begins! Education The Greater Crestview Area offers first-class, first-rate educational opportunities - from kindergarten to graduate schools, within commuting distance. Each of our schools is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Our students consistently score above state and national averages on standardized tests, including SAT and ACT. Crestview is home to an Okaloosa-Walton Community College (OWCC) Center. The main campus is fifteen miles South of Crestview in Niceville. Recreation In the Greater Crestview Area, you can enjoy outdoor activities year-round in a relaxed atmosphere. The climate is mild with an average summer temperature of 80 degrees and an average winter temperature of 51 degrees. There are many city parks with ball fields, bicycle/pedestrian facilities and playgrounds. Also, a half-mile clay track is available to the public at the Old Spanish Trail Park, which is also the site of the Family Fun Day festival, the Crestview Music Fest, and the Old Spanish Trail Festival. Three scenic rivers, numerous lakes, acres of unspoiled forests and many golf courses make the area a true paradise for those who love boating, fishing, and many other outdoor activities. In addition, the Greater Crestview Area communities support numerous social, civic and service clubs and organizations from scouting for boys and girls, to professional associations, to a varied program of sports and interest programs. Twenty-four service and charitable organizations offer activities for the civic-minded. 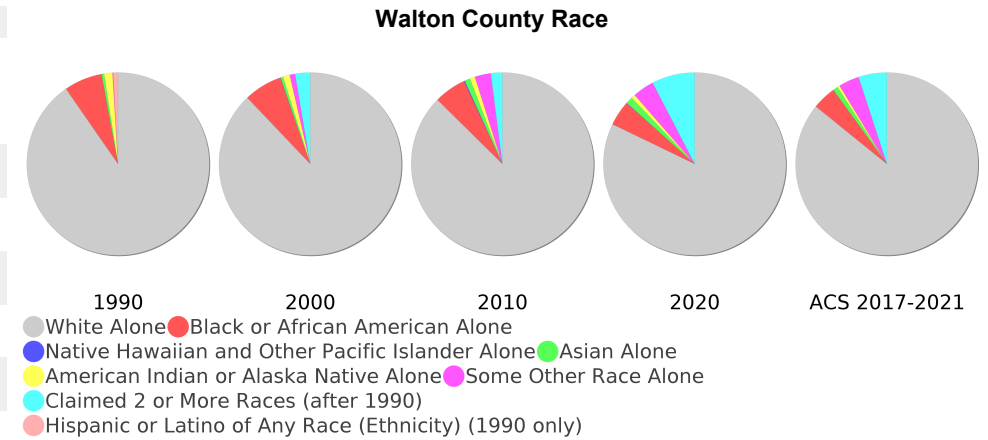

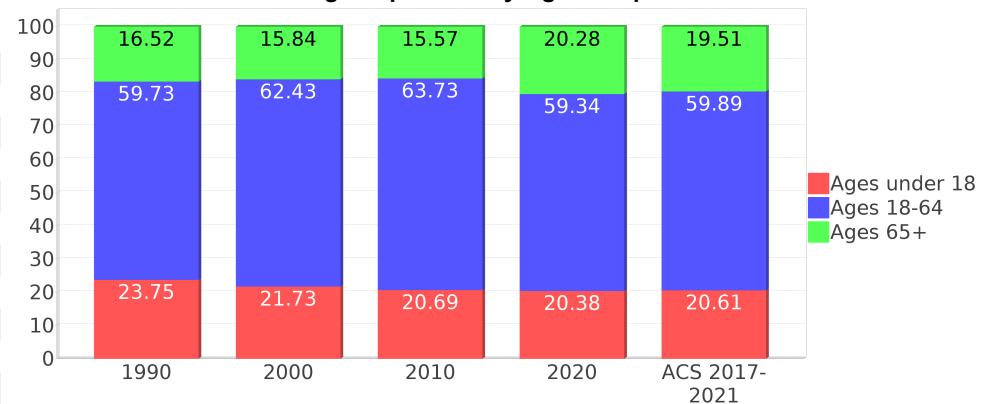

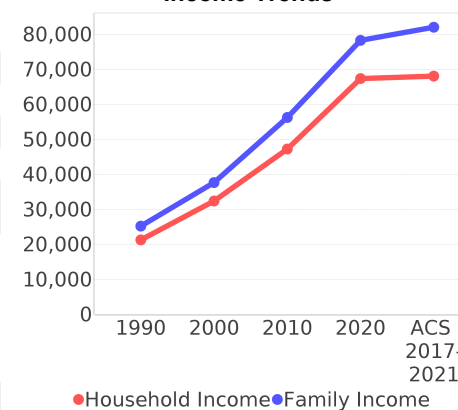
Percentage Population by Age Group - Walton



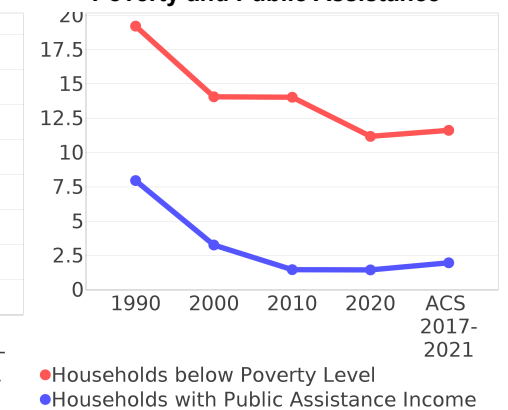

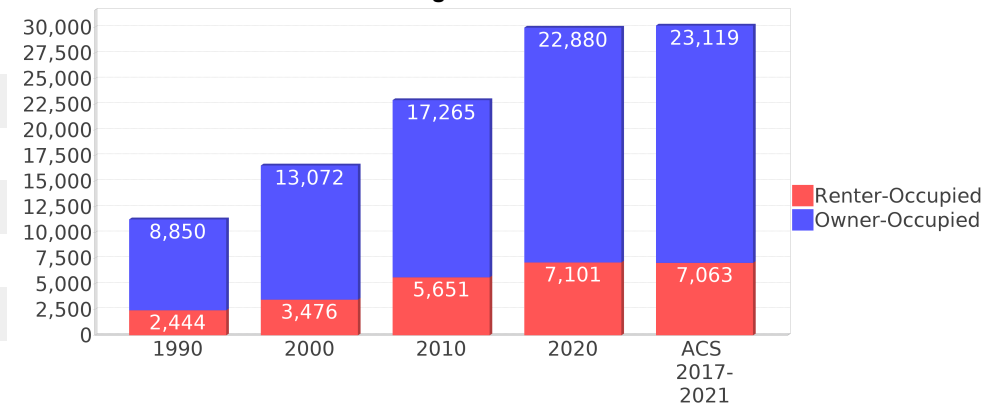

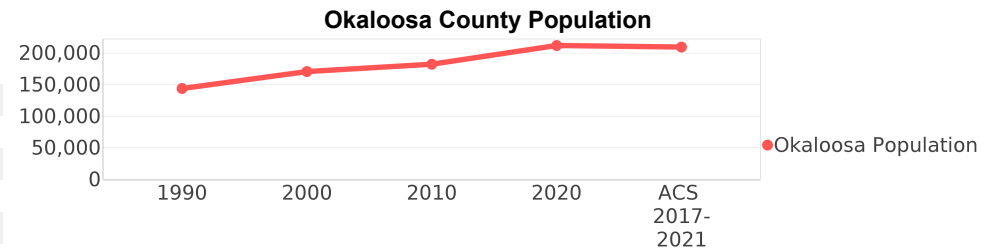
Housing Tenure - Walton

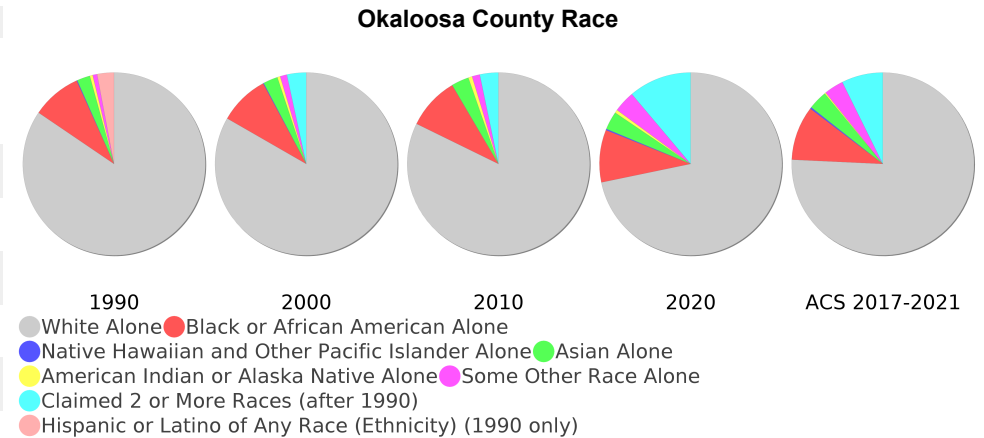

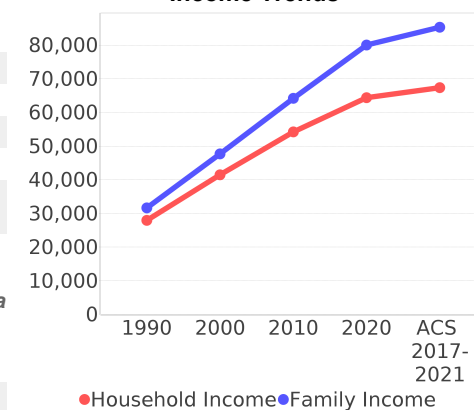

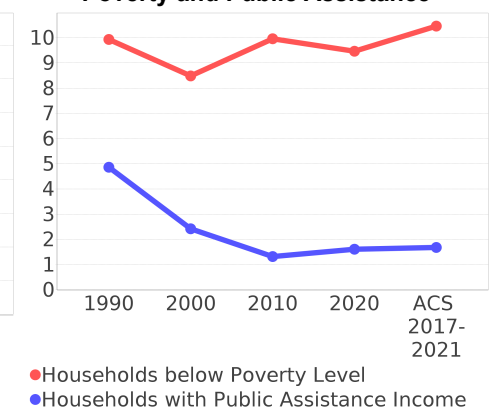

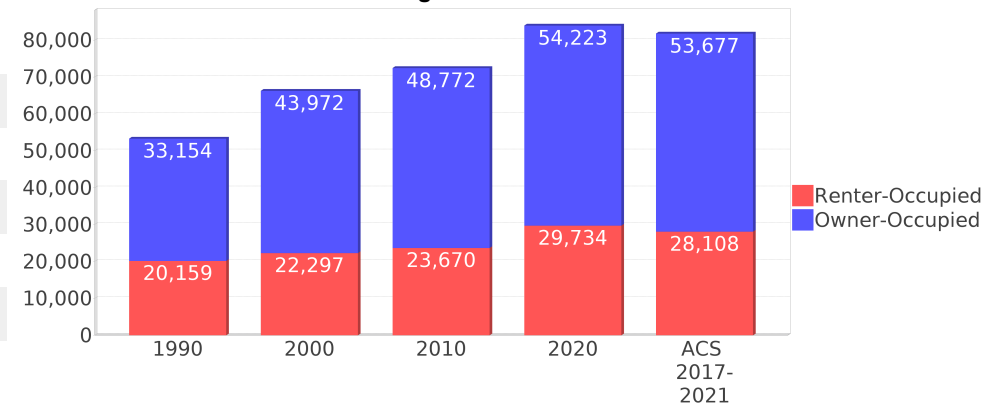

Data Sources

ACS vs Census Data

(1) The 2010 and 2020 Census data is represented by a combination of decennial and ACS data. The 2010 decennial is combined with the 5-year ACS data for 2006-2010 and the 2020 decennial is combined with the 5-year ACS data for 2016-2020. The General Population Trends, Race and Ethnicity Trends, and Age Trends are entirely from the decennial. The Income Trends, Disability Trends, Educational Attainment Trends, and Language Trends are entirely from the ACS. The Housing Trends section is derived from both: Decennial (Total # Housing Units, Housing Units per Acre, Owner-Occupied Units, Renter-Occupied Units, Vacant Units); ACS (Single-Family Units, Multi-family Units, Mobile Homes, Median Housing Value, Occupied Housing Units w/No Vehicle).

Area

(2) The geographic area of the community based on a user-defined community boundary or area of interest (AOI) boundary.

Jurisdiction

(3) Jurisdiction(s) includes local government boundaries that intersect the user-defined community or AOI boundary.

Goals, Values and History

(4) Information under the headings Goals and Values and History is entered manually by the user before the Sociocultural Data Report (SDR) is generated. This information is usually not available for communities with boundaries that are based on Census-defined places (i.e., not user-specified).

Demographic Data

(5) Demographic data reported under the headings General Population Trends, Race and Ethnicity Trends, Age Trends, Income Trends, Educational Attainment Trends, Language Trends, and Housing Trends is from the U.S. Decennial Census for 1990 and 2000 and the American Community Survey (ACS) 5-year estimates for 2006-2010 and ACS 2017-2021. The data was gathered at the block group level for user-defined communities, Census places, and AOIs, and at the county level for counties. Depending on the dataset, the data represents 100% counts (Census Summary File 1) or sample-based information (Census Summary File 3 or ACS). About the Census Data

(6) The block group analysis for ETDM project analysis areas, user-defined communities, Census places, and AOI boundaries do not always correspond precisely to block group boundaries. To estimate the actual population more accurately, the SDR analysis adjusts the geographic area and data of affected block groups using the following methodology:

Delete overlapping census blocks with extremely low populations (2 or fewer people)
Remove the portion of the block group that lies outside of the analysis area
Recalculate the demographics assuming an equal area distribution of the population

Note that there may be areas where there is no population.

(7) Use caution when comparing the 100% count data (Decennial Census) to the sample-based data (ACS). In any given year, about one in 40 U.S. households will receive the ACS questionnaire. Over any five-year period, about one in eight households will receive the questionnaire, as compared to about one in six that received the long form questionnaire for the Decennial Census 2000. (8) Race and ethnicity are separate questions on the Census questionnaire. Individuals can report multiple race and ethnicity answers; therefore, numbers in the Race and Ethnicity portion of this report may add up to be greater than the total population. In addition, use caution when interpreting changes in race and ethnicity over time. Starting with the 2000 Decennial Census, respondents could select one or more race categories. Also in 2000, the placement of the question about Hispanic origin changed, helping to increase responsiveness to the Hispanic-origin question. Because of these and other changes, the 1990 data on race and ethnicity are not directly comparable with data from later censuses. (9) The "Minority" calculations use both the race and ethnicity responses from Census and ACS data. In this report, "Minority" refers to individuals who list a race other than White and/or list their ethnicity as Hispanic/Latino. In other words, people who are multi-racial, any single race other than White, or Hispanic/Latino of any race are considered minorities. We use the following formula: $\text{MINORITY} = \text{TOTALPOP} - \text{WHITE_NH}$ where TOTALPOP is the Total Population and WHITE_NH is the population with a race of White alone and an ethnicity of Not Hispanic or Latino. Translating this to the field names used in the census ACS source data, the formula looks like this: $\text{MINORITY} = \text{B01003_E001} - \text{B03002_E003}$. (Note, the WHITE_NH population is not reported separately in this report.)

(10) Disability data is not included in the 2010 Decennial Census or the 2006-2010 ACS. This data is available in the ACS 2017-2021 ACS. Because of changes made to the Census and ACS questions between 1990 and ACS, disability variables should not be compared from year to year. For example: 1) with the 1990 data, the disabilities are listed as a "work disability" while this distinction is not made with 2000 or ACS data; 2) the ACS data includes the institutionalized population (e.g. persons in prisons and group homes) while this population is not included in 1990 or 2000; and 3) the age groupings changed over the years.

(11) The category Bachelor's Degree or Higher under the heading Educational Attainment Trends is a subset of the category High School Graduate or Higher.

(12) Income of households. This includes the income of the householder and all other individuals 15 years old and over in the household, whether they are related to the householder or not. Because many households consist of only one person, average household income is usually less than average family income.

(13) Income of families. In compiling statistics on family income, the incomes of all members 15 years old and over related to the householder are summed and treated as a single amount.

(14) Age trends. The median age for 1990 is not available.

Land Use Data

(15) The Land Use information Indicates acreages and percentages for the generalized land use types used to group parcel-specific, existing land use assigned by the county property appraiser office according to the Florida Department of Revenue land use codes.

Community Facilities Data

- (16) Assisted Rental Housing Units - Identifies multifamily rental developments that receive funding assistance under federal, state, and local government programs to offer affordable housing as reported by the Shimberg Center for Housing Studies, University of Florida.
- (17) Mobile Home Parks - Identifies approved or acknowledged mobile home parks reported by the Florida Department of Business and Professional Regulation and Florida Department of Health.
- (18) Migrant Camps - Identifies migrant labor camp facilities inspected by the Florida Department of Health.
- (19) Group Care Facilities - Identifies group care facilities inspected by the Florida Department of Health.
- (20) Community Center and Fraternal Association Facilities - Identifies facilities reported by multiple sources.
- (21) Law Enforcement Correctional Facilities - Identifies facilities reported by multiple sources.
- (22) Cultural Centers - Identifies cultural centers including organizations, buildings, or complexes that promote culture and arts (e.g., aquariums and zoological facilities; arboreta and botanical gardens; dinner theaters; drive-ins; historical places and services; libraries; motion picture theaters; museums and art galleries; performing arts centers; performing arts theaters; planetariums; studios and art galleries; and theater producers stage facilities) reported by multiple sources.
- (23) Fire Department and Rescue Station Facilities - Identifies facilities reported by multiple sources.
- (24) Government Buildings - Identifies local, state, and federal government buildings reported by multiple sources.
- (25) Health Care Facilities - Identifies health care facilities including abortion clinics, dialysis clinics, medical doctors, nursing homes, osteopaths, state laboratories/clinics, and surgicenters/walk-in clinics reported by the Florida Department of Health.
- (26) Hospital Facilities - Identifies hospital facilities reported by multiple sources.
- (27) Law Enforcement Facilities - Identifies law enforcement facilities reported by multiple sources.
- (28) Parks and Recreational Facilities - Identifies parks and recreational facilities reported by multiple sources.
- (29) Religious Center Facilities - Identifies religious centers including churches, temples, synagogues, mosques, chapels, centers, and other types of religious facilities reported by multiple sources.
- (30) Private and Public Schools - Identifies private and public schools reported by multiple sources.
- (31) Social Service Centers - Identifies social service centers reported by multiple sources.
- (32) Veteran Organizations and Facilities

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(36) The "Minority" calculations use both the race and ethnicity responses from Census and ACS data. In this report, "Minority" refers to individuals who list a race other than White and/or list their ethnicity as Hispanic/Latino.
